


HOWDEN CHRISTMAS LATE NIGHT SHOPPING THURSDAY 5TH DECEMBER 2013

HOWDEN FLOODING - UPDATE

The sun was out, the sky was blue when messages from the Town Council's flood phone started to come through. Thursday 5 July 2012, a very localised storm was hitting Howden and Goole. Howden was under water!

The next four days were spent 'all hands to the pumps' pumping gardens and streets across Howden. In the following weeks a detailed report was sent through to the East Riding of Yorkshire Council highlighting the key areas that had suffered from flooding around Howden. There had been very little response to requests for help from the East Riding as Goole and other areas were suffering as well, everyone was stretched. Howden had been left to the Town Council and the pumps it had purchased a few years previous.

A meeting was held with the East Riding to talk over what had taken place over the four days and what we felt was needed to prevent any further flooding around Howden. There were the obvious blocked road drains, ditches running at capacity and flooded roads. In addition to what could be seen there was the underlying issue of which organisation was responsible for which drain?

The East Riding of Yorkshire Council have, with a considerable amount of encouragement from the Town Council

undertaken a number of investigations and where they can they have undertaken repairs or unblocked drains. What has been achieved so far and what is outstanding is listed opposite. In addition a meeting between the East Riding of Yorkshire Council, The Ouse and Humber Drainage Board, Yorkshire Water and Howden Town Council is due to take place to try and identify who is responsible for which section of drain and what can be done to maintain the drainage system around Howden. In addition the East Riding of Yorkshire Council have applied the National Flood Defence Grant in Aid for funding to address some of the bigger projects that have been identified.

The above is a simplified update on all the work being undertaken. Hopefully, long term it will address the flooding issues. However it must be pointed out that the local and wider drainage system, even when clear and working can only cope with a certain amount of water, especially if the heavens open again directly over Howden! If you do notice any blocked drains or flooding on the roads report it to the East Riding of Yorkshire Council either by phone **01482 393939** (24hrs), log the issue as a complaint on their web site via the compliment, comment or complaint section, or in person at the Customer Service Centre on Hailgate.

Issue	Action	
Longs Corner Roundabout - water sitting on the road following rain	Drains were identified and cleared by ERYC.	
Water sitting on Hull Road by the bus stop	Repairs being undertaken to the road gullies in the area by ERYC.	
Flooding of Hull Road and Thorpe Road Avenues	Above two issues will reduce the amount of water running into Hull Rd Avenue. The route of the surface water sewer has been identified between Thorpe Rd Ave and Hull Rd Ave. Part of the system was jet cleaned. A further site visit will be required to clear the downstream section of the system. In addition an additional road gully is recommended at the lower end of Hull Rd Ave.	
Derwent Road, road flooding	Access to the existing riparian culvert was found to be inadequate. An additional access chamber will be provided at the junction with the main surface water culvert at Hull Rd.	
Selby Road, road flooding	The surface water culvert was jet cleaned from Blakeys Crossing in both directions. An obstruction was found at the rear of Kensington Gardens. Further site works will be required to clear the obstruction. However, the system is operational at this time.	
Buttfield Road/Meadows, various issues including blocked drains and overflowing field drains	Yorkshire Water contractors removed an obstruction from a drain on The Meadows. ERYC have repaired a section of road drain in the area of Buttfield Lane. ERYC have cleared one of the drains feeding the open drain on Buttfield Rd but further investigations are required to locate and clear the outlet drain that runs along Buttfield Rd.	
Batty Lane	Investigations have found that there is a lack of capacity in the drains. ERYC working on a preferred option.	
Station Road, pooling near junction with Flatgate	Collapsed drain, repairs undertaken by ERYC.	
Other works	The Drainage Board has undertaken clearance works to the drains they are responsible for.



NEWS FROM THE ASHES

As most of you will know The Ashes Playing Field is run by a charity and not by the local or East Riding council.

As with any charity we have to obtain funds, grants etc in order to function.

Howden Town Council have always been the main provider of funds giving us an annual grant. This money is taken from the parish precept charge of your council tax.

During the last few years the Ashes Trust has benefitted from funds not only for the standard maintenance (our Groundsman's wages) but grants for trees, paths and the pavilion maintenance. We have also been able to start building funds for equipment replacement and an emergency fund.

However, due to central government capping local expenditure, this last year saw a substantial drop in the funding available to us and next year could be worse!!!

I would, however, like to take this opportunity to thank Howden Town Council for their continued support.

In order to combat this shortfall (and we are not the only group to lose out on these grants) we have embarked on a series of fundraising events engaging with council members and other local groups. The first

In order for us to keep the park functioning as it is, to continue maintenance and to make improvements we have to keep fund raising. If we can do this by putting on functions such as Mayfest, that we know you enjoy then we will. If we ask for donations and you feel able to give then thank you!

2014 promises to be a difficult year for the Trust but with your continued support we know we can make it work.

VANDALISM AT DERWENT CRESCENT PARK

Town Councillors are very concerned about a recent spate of vandalism at the park which has seen two large pieces of play equipment put out of use.

A large basket swing had to be removed from the play area, because the rope binding had been cut and the rope unravelled to the extent that it had become unsafe.

Shortly after that, a lateral balance swing was dismantled by vandals which rendered it unusable. There was a suspicion that it was their intention to sell it for scrap metal value. Fortunately a local resident of Derwent Crescent, when he found out what had happened, removed the pieces to his own

The East Riding of Yorkshire Council is considering a review of the Controlled Parking Zone and Car Parks in Howden. The Town Council would like the views of residents, so that these can be raised during the review.

Any suggestions would be welcome as to how to improve the parking situation in the garden for safe keeping and was able to repair and restore it with the help of other residents and local police. Many thanks to you all!

Unfortunately the basket, which is only a year old, could not be repaired and will be replaced at a cost of $\pounds 950$. We are very grateful to the local resident who repaired the swing, as replacing it would have cost $\pounds_{3,650}!$

It is such a shame that this kind of mindless vandalism by a few people can spoil things for everyone else. Please can local residents keep an eye open for any suspicious activity at the park and report concerns to the police and to us at the Town Council.
